



Your tricky legal questions answered

'Drink-drive **charge is** hard to swallow'

I was riding home in London with my girlfriend on the back after a night out when I had an incident. This guy was road raging me so I decided to speed away from the lights to get away from him. Suddenly a pedestrian ran out in front of me and we collided. I and my girlfriend were injured. The police turned up and breathalysed me and I was under the limit (I had a couple of beers over a few hours but knew I would be fine). At hospital they took a blood sample and I was over the limit. They calculated I was doing 46 in a 30. I am now being charged with dangerous driving while intoxicated. I was under the limit and did not cause the crash so I need help as the hearing is coming up.

You may be entitled to Legal Aid considering this is a serious offence. Alternatively many motor insurance policies have legal protection which could pay the legal costs of defending the charges against you. Although they often exclude drink driving cases, you are innocent until

proven guilty so I would check your policy. There are a few unusual aspects to your case which require investigation. Why did they take a blood sample if you had already passed the roadside test? Why are they not investigating the other driver's and pedestrian's conduct, without which. arguably, the accident would not have happened? I strongly suggest you seek advice from a criminal solicitor.

Ultimately, if the team boss isn't happy, the rider can't be happy. And if you are honest with yourself, then sometimes you are actually better off to split and go a different way.


Contracts aren't worth the paper they are written on; a handshake is as good as a

I didn't get paid, but I wasn't happy and I ended up riding the Vitrans bike at the end of the year and loved it. It was so much better for me. You have to be singing from the same hymn sheet or it'll never work.

Riders aren't perfect, some can be right prima donnas! I saw

You have to have respect. You need to be constructive. smashing things up isn't the way forward.

On the other side, if you sack someone off to bring someone else in, it doesn't necessarily mean your team is going to go forward in the results. This is a difficult game and nobody jumps on a new bike and goes straigh
