Get a grip on TC

I have just finished reading your Adventure-Lite review and once again I see a statement questioning whether a lower power bike needs traction control. What seems to lie behind this mindset is that a relatively modest bike

with decent tyres will not have a problem with losing traction due to an over enthusiastic right hand. This ignores the third component contributing to traction: the road surface. In fact, I would say that this is the most important factor that TC addresses. I well remember an occasion riding a bike with "only 49bhp" and no TC on a road in Spain and experiencing violent fish-tailing when leaving a junction in my usual sedate manner. When I went back to investigate the cause I found a large area of concrete patch in the road surface, worn mirror smooth through use and hidden under a layer of dust.



Your tricky legal questions answered

'Can I appeal decision?'

I was in court last week for my bike accident claim where I was claiming against a car driver for injuries caused. I lost my case but have been told it is possible to anneal the decision and receive a retrial. Basically, the accident involved the driver turning in front of me but the judge found fully in favour of the driver and, to be honest, I don't think he really understood the evidence Alex G, email

There is a time limit of 21 days from the decision in which to lodge an appeal. To succeed you will need to show that the judge was: (a) Plainly wrong in law or fact (and this had a bearing or the result) or (b) Erred seriously in his iudament - in other words that no

reasonable judge would have

found as he did.

'You need an urgent opinion from a lawyer'

would be for the lawyer who represented you to write an urgent short opinion on the prospects of a successful appeal and ask your legal expenses insurer to fund it. They may not due to proportionality (costs versus benefit) if the case is only of modest value. I note you don't say how badly injured you were. If the insurer does not agree to fund it then your other option is to pay privately. Again, you may feel proportionality will rule this option out.
