


experienced such issues.



Can injured driver claim?'

I was following a Mercedes on my Suzuki GSX and as I went to overtake, the driver accelerated hard. This meant that the gap between me and the oncoming car was not as great as I thought Liust managed to get back onto my side of the road but the oncoming car swerved to avoid me and went into a lamp post. I stopped but the Mercedes driver did not. Now I have received a letter from solicitors claiming compensation for their client's injuries in his car accident and telling me to send the letter to my insurer. They claim their client had injuries from his airbags going off/whiplash. Am I liable? Scott, Pontypridd

'CCTV might help trace the other driver'

You need to notify your insurer about the letter. The actions of the Mercedes driver seem to have contributed to this and could be regarded as dangerous driving if he deliberately accelerated to prevent your overtake. Witnesses or CCTV may be able to identity him. If so, the claimant's solicitors could be redirected to his insurer but they are still likely to go for you, leaving you to bring in the Mercedes driver as another Defendant in the case.

The Motor Insurers' Bureau will not compensate the injured driver if you were partly to blame for the accident and will leave your insurer to do so, the MIB being a fund of last resort.
