Go big, Norton!



Your tricky legal questions answered

'Should I just take the cash?'

I had an accident six weeks ago on the morning commute and the other driver's insurance have contacted me and said I don't need a solicitor. They have already repaired my bike and offered compensation. This seems reasonable but my dad is telling me that I need a lawyer to stop me from being ripped off. Rebecca, email

The insurer's interest is the opposite to yours they want to pay as little money as they can, but you want the correct amount of compensation. Because the injured rider typically has no experience of the legal process the insurer is able to get away with paying less than they should.

It has been common for insurers to make settlement offers very soon after the accident before the injured

'The insurer wants to pay the minimum

person has seen a medical expert. The problem with this is the full extent of a person's injuries, and importantly the prognosis, are unknown. If you then find out you have a more serious injury then there is no second bite of the cherry.

The Civil Liability Act introduced a ban on offers to settle whiplash claims without a medical report, so if your injury was a 'low value' claim of this type then this is a serious breach of the law by the insurer.
