

Can I cash in an interim payment safely?

I had an accident when a car pulled out of a junction. I couldn't swerve as there was a car coming the other way. We collided and I went over the bonnet. My claims company sent me an interim payment from the third party's insurer and said I should pay it into my bank account. I'm worried if I do cash it, it will be seen as full payment, or I may have to repay it because the letter is worded 'This is an interim navment issued without prejudice. We reserve the right to claim this payment back'. Ray, email

'lam worried I may have to repay it'

This is a partial payment paid on an interim basis, until such time as the claim concludes. The value of interim payments made is deducted by the paying party at the end of the claim to avoid a Claimant making a double recovery. The wording used by your opponent's insurer is to protect them should something come to light meaning that, in fact, the accident was your fault. Based on the scenario you have outlined, this is unlikely

Sometimes insurers issue interim cheques with the cover letter stating that it is in full and final settlement of the claim. In these circumstances the Claimant's solicitor should write confirming the real position and that it will be banked on the basis of it being an interim payment, not a full and final settlement.
